Testing for Lead Levels In Children

Molina Healthcare of Illinois (Molina) stresses the importance of testing children for lead levels in their blood. Lead can enter through the skin, inhalation, or swallowing a contaminated object. Even small amounts of lead can cause serious health, developmental, and behavioral problems.

HFS-recommended testing schedule

According to the Department of Healthcare and Family Services (HFS), lead poisoning is the most common preventable pediatric health problem in the United States today. Children should be tested before the ages of 12 months and 24 months. Children over the age of 24 months, up to their 7th birthday, should receive a blood lead test if one has not already been done.

Either a capillary test or a venous blood draw is sufficient for testing lead levels. HFS medical programs cover pediatric blood lead tests. Blood lead screening is a covered service for all Molina members in all lines of business.

Resources for providers

The Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) has a robust Lead Poisoning Prevention program offering ample information and resources. For instance, providers can help screen patient risk using the <u>Childhood Lead Risk Questionnaire</u> and download information for patients about preventing lead exposure in their homes and surroundings.
